“And she brought forth her firstborn son, and wrapped him in swaddling clothes, and laid him in a manger; because there was no room for them in the inn.”

[At] the first Christmas there were no tinsel Christmas trees, no family gatherings, no children at play. Christmas gifts? There were none at that time. But God now gave His gift to the world—that of His Only Begotten Son. What a gift this was! Think what it means to us! We can learn patience, devotion, and faithfulness. We can follow the true gospel principles, being in the world but not of the world. We can be kind and thoughtful. We can be honest and fair to others. (The Gifts of Christmas, Petersen)

Christmas gifts do not need to be purchased in stores. We can use our own special talents to make gifts for our families and friends, or we can offer gifts of service to others. Jesus said, “If ye love me, keep my commandments.” One of the most important gifts we can give this Christmas season is to do what He has asked of us. Is there something you can...consecrate—[a gift] that perhaps you never thought the Lord might want? We think of limitations as something to get rid of, and certainly we should not cling voluntarily to any limitation that hinders our spiritual growth. But what about a physical handicap? What does offering deafness or blindness to the Lord make of that handicap? What about poverty? What about a spiritual gift such as the gift of faith to be healed? What about a discerning heart? What about the desire to minister? What about singleness? What about the circumstances of a divorce? Don't think that the Lord can do without any of your gifts, no matter how you feel about them. This is exactly the kind of gift that Joseph Mohr offered when the St. Nicholas' church organ wasn't working and would not be repaired before Christmas. Mohr remembered a poem he had written a few years before and decided those words might make a good carol for his congregation the following evening at their Christmas Eve service. The one problem was that he didn't have any music to which that poem could be sung. So, the next day Mohr went to see the church organist, Franz Xaver Gruber. Gruber only had a few hours to come up with a melody which could be sung with a guitar. However, by that evening, Gruber had managed to compose a musical setting for the poem. It no longer mattered to Mohr and Gruber that their church organ was inoperable. They had written "Silent Night" and reminded the world that our most powerful gifts can come from what we lack. SILENT NIGHT (small group or family)

"Behold the Lamb of God, yea, even the Son of the Eternal Father!...[And] The love of God, which sheddeth itself abroad in the hearts of the children of men; wherefore, it is the most desireable above all things...Yea, and the most joyous to the soul."
